Alzheimer's disease causes about 70% of cases of dementia. 1 In the Framingham study, Bachman and colleagues reported that the incidence of Alzheimer's disease increases from 3.5 per 1000 per year between the ages of 65 and 69 to 72.8 per 1000 per year at ages 85 to 89 years. 2 Bachman and colleagues found that the incidence of Alzheimer's disease doubled with every 5 years of age.
